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Rahab - Her Story

There isn't much known about Rahab before her introduction in Joshua 2, where she is described as a prostitute or harlot. According to Merriam-Webster.com, a prostitute is someone who engages in sex acts—particularly intercourse—in exchange for payment. While we don't have insight into Jericho's economic conditions, the Bible makes it clear that Rahab was well-known in the city. She owned her own home in a prime location—on the city wall—and had enough space to hide two grown men.

From a modern perspective, Rahab was a businesswoman. She had a profitable enterprise, and I'd even argue she had marketing skills—after all, the spies found her easily. Her high visibility also meant that when word about the spies spread, it reached the king himself.

In business, knowing when to pivot is crucial. Entrepreneurs must understand risk and reward, and Rahab demonstrated this instinctively when she chose to align herself with the God of Israel.

At this moment, Rahab had to do one important thing—trust God.

In Joshua 2:9, Rahab boldly declared:
“I know that the Lord has given you the land.”

But how did she know? Knowing, believing, and acting are not the same. Rahab wasn't just aware of God—she was convinced of His power. She had no doubt. She recounted the miracles the Lord had done for Israel and, with confidence, made a strategic deal with the spies to secure her family's future. Now, you might be thinking, Okay, and? But hear me out.

Rahab had lived a life of sin, but she had qualities that God could use. She was an outsider—someone who didn't belong. Yet, when she heard about the God of Israel, her faith was activated, and she acted on it.



Recap:

1. Rahab believed God.
2. Rahab had faith in God.

Faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God (Romans 10:17).

3. Rahab acted on what she believed.

I strongly believe that Rahab's business mindset prepared her for this moment. She understood risk, timing, and negotiation—qualities that played a role in her faith-driven decision. Deceiving the king's men and redirecting them took courage and strategy. If her plan had failed, she would have been executed—no matter whose side she was on. But Rahab believed God. She was confident in the plan. She trusted the spies to keep their word.

God's Redemptive Power

God's redemptive power was at work the entire time. Notice that the spies weren't led to a religious leader's house. Instead, God led them to Rahab's home. Because God wasn't looking to condemn her—He was looking to redeem her.

Faith was the key. Faith is Kingdom currency—without it, it is impossible to please God. “But without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him.” – Hebrews 11:6

Rahab's faith was so significant that she was honored in Scripture:

“By faith, the harlot Rahab did not perish with those who did not believe, when she had received the spies with peace.” – Hebrews 11:31

“Likewise, was not Rahab the harlot also justified by works when she received the messengers and sent them out another way?” – James 2:25

James makes it clear:

“For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also.” – James 2:26

Rahab didn't just believe—she acted on her faith. And because of that, she didn't just survive—she became part of Jesus' genealogy (Matthew 1:5). Her story proves that God can use anyone who believes in Him.

The Components of Faith

1. Believe God.
2. Increase in faith (Faith comes by hearing – Romans 10:17).
3. Act on what you believe.

How God Can Use Anyone - No Matter the Background

Understanding God

God is not distant or unaware of us. He knew us before we were even born (Jeremiah 1:5). We are not a surprise to Him, and He will never turn away a sincere heart that desires to follow Him. “For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life. For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved.” – John 3:16-17

Pro-Tip:

Where it says “For God so loved the world,” replace “world” with your name and read it aloud.

Make it personal—because He loves you.

God is a Safe Space

This is big. You. Me. Us. We are not a surprise to God.

We can come to Him with everything—our fears, failures, struggles—because He cares for us. He is our refuge, our safe place, and our healer.

“Trust in Him at all times, you people; pour out your heart before Him; God is a refuge for us.” – Psalm 62:8

“Casting all your care upon Him, for He cares for you.” – 1 Peter 5:7

If you once had a relationship with God and want to come back—come. If this is your first time considering a relationship with God—welcome!

Simply pray this prayer sincerely, and heaven rejoices as you make this decision:

Salvation Prayer

Father God, I come to You just as I am. I repent of all my past sins—I didn’t know, but today I choose You. Lord, come into my heart, live in me and through me. I believe in my heart that Jesus died and rose again. I receive You, Jesus, as my Lord and Savior right now. Today, I am saved, and I commit to living my life completely for You. In Jesus’ name, Amen.

Congratulations!  Heaven is celebrating YOU.

Rahab’s story is a reminder that God is not looking at your past—He’s looking at your faith. No matter who you are or where you come from, He can use you. If He did it for Rahab, He can do it for you. Will you trust Him?
